The symposium presents findings from three workshops, held in Manchester, Copenhagen and Munich, that focused on issues of diversity, including screen content that has been – or could be – made for and about Arabic-speaking and other children newly arrived in Europe through forced migration. Bringing together players involved in producing, regulating, funding, commissioning and commenting on children's screen media in Europe, the symposium will launch a Stakeholder Resource Book including recommendations arising from these European-Arab exchanges. With five sessions involving practitioners, diversity advocates and academics, the symposium considers the challenges and opportunities for showing diversity in a range of children's content across a variety of platforms.
